Reading for Detail: (EXAMPLES: What do squid eat? What year did the Civil War start?) • Facts • Answers are stated directly in the book and can't be argued about • Questions can be answered in short phrases or one sentence.
 Inferential Thinking: (EXAMPLES: Why does Trump think he would make a good president? What would happen to the deer population if wolves went extinct?) Not directly stated in the book. Need to read between the lines and use clues to figure things out Needs support from the text to justify (explain) an answer. Inferential questions often (but not always) start with Why
 Critical Thinking: (EXAMPLES: What qualities do you think are important for a president? Should cigarettes and alcohol be taxed?) Often have more than one possible correct answer. Often goes beyond the book. Connects issues and events in the book to our lives, the world or what is right or wrong in general. Requires a lot of explanation and supporting details. Can be opinion questions- but opinions must be supported with facts or reasons. Critical thinking questions might start with: What should, How should, What/how would you, Do you agree, Why do
